Paris to Hollywood

THE FASHION AND INFLUENCE OF VÉRONIQUE AND GREGORY PECK

This exhibition presents 100 ensembles from the wardrobe of Parisian writer, philanthropist, and fashion influencer Véronique Peck. This selection of haute couture, fashion sketches, photos, film clips, never-seen-before family snapshots, and documents, such as letters and receipts, is being exhibited publicly for the first time, providing a unique look into the style of one of Hollywood's most beloved couples.

Organized by the Denver Art Museum and curated by Florence Müller, Avenir Foundation Curator of Textile Art and Fashion, the presentation covers more than four decades, from the 1950s to the 1990s. In conjunction with the exhibition, Véronique and Gregory's daughter, Cecilia Peck Voll, has gifted the Denver Art Museum 20 of her mother's iconic looks for the museum's collection.

VÉRONIQUE AND GREGORY

Born in Paris, France, in 1932, Véronique Passani was a writer for the daily French newspaper France-Soir when she met Gregory Peck at the age of 20. Véronique reviewed books, theater performances and exhibitions. Despite being a young woman in a patriarchal society, she interviewed high-profile celebrities, including General Eisenhower, Samuel Goldwyn, Albert Schweitzer, and the French writer Colette. Peck, arguably the most famous Hollywood actor at the time, was filming Roman Holiday with Audrey Hepburn in Italy when he interviewed with Véronique for France-Soir in Paris. The meeting was the beginning of a love story that culminated in a marriage that lasted nearly five decades until Gregory's death in 2003.

When Véronique moved from Paris to Hollywood in 1955, she brought with her a nuanced Parisian elegance and quickly became one of the most influential women in Hollywood. Gregory and Véronique donated and raised millions of dollars for the American Cancer Society, the Motion Picture and Television Fund, the Academy of Motion Picture Art and Sciences, the American Film Institute, the Los Angeles Music Center, and the Los Angeles Public Library. In 1967, Véronique's fundraising and passionate support for the Inner City Cultural Center led to her being named "Woman of the Year" by the Los Angeles Times.

Véronique's close relationships with global designers such as Yves Saint Laurent, Pierre Cardin, Hubert de Givenchy, and André Courrèges, as well as Hollywood stars like Princess Grace of Monaco, essentially made her an ambassador between the couturiers of Europe and the Hollywood elite.

"Véronique was, and remains, an exemplary figure of fashion with an emblematic wardrobe," said curator Müller. "She amassed a collection of over 300 couture dresses, which she wore to the Oscars, the White House, film premieres, and international galas from Paris to Rome, Cannes, New York, and Los Angeles. It has truly been an honor to curate this exhibition with looks and documentations from the Peck collection."

THE EXHIBITION

A variety of designers from France, Italy, the U.S. and the U.K. are being represented in the exhibition, including Yves Saint Laurent, André Courrèges, Valentino, Balenciaga, Christian Dior, Givenchy, Moschino, Pucci, Guy Laroche, Thea Porter, Pierre Cardin, Jacques Griffe, Jean Louis Scherrer, Rudi Gernreich, and Sonia Rykiel.

Divided into twelve sections organized thematically and chronologically, the exhibition displays iconic milestones in the history of fashion such as the minidress and pantsuits of André Courrèges. Véronique is praised for introducing Courrèges to the U.S. in the 1960s. Her wardrobe is a testament to the fact that leading designers viewed her as a fashion ambassador and influencer of her time. The first presentation of its kind, *Paris to Hollywood* also will include one of Gregory Peck's tuxedos.

An illustrated color catalog accompanies *Paris to Hollywood*, including three essays and an introduction by Müller, and interviews with Véronique Peck's friends, Sharon Stone and Laura Dern, conducted by Müller. The catalog also includes biographies of each of the 15 couturiers presented in the exhibition, written by Jane Burke, senior curatorial assistant of textile art and fashion at the DAM. The catalog features images of the couture and designer pieces, along with a selection of archival photos, documents, sketches, and family photos. The catalog is available for purchase online and in the Shop.

Paris to Hollywood is included in general admission, which is free for museum members and youth 18 and under. Following public health guidelines, new general admission tickets will be released under restricted capacity and social distancing guidelines. Tickets will be made available to members up to 10 days in advance.

For the better part of three decades, English-born American painter Thomas Moran (1837–1926) traversed the rugged wilds of the American West, sketching and later painting its magnificent landscapes. In many ways, Thomas Moran, more than any other painter of the nineteenth century, convinced Americans to appreciate the beauty of their own continent.

While Moran celebrated the landscapes of his chosen country, however, his native England had a significant impression on his stylistic approach. Born in Bolton, England, Moran grew up near Philadelphia, where he began his artistic career. As early as the mid-1850s he became interested in the writings of the English philosopher and art critic John Ruskin who professed the central tenet of "truth to nature" and celebrated the paintings of J.M.W. Turner. Bright color and shimmering light producing a poetic quality are a hallmark of Turner's work and one that Moran mimics in his most expressive paintings. Moran visited Italy, France, England, Cuba, and Mexico, and traveled extensively throughout America.

Today, the artist is best known for his grandiose canvases of Yellowstone and the Grand Canyon. He first ventured west in 1871, joining an expedition led by Ferdinand V. Hayden, director of the U.S. Geological Survey, to the then little-known Yellowstone region. Moran's paintings, along with the photographs of the noted Denver photographer William Henry Jackson, revealed to the American public the scale and picturesque beauty of the Yellowstone region and thrust the painter into national stardom. Two years later, Moran joined John Wesley Powell's expedition down the Colorado River through the Grand Canyon.

Lesser known are Moran's sojourns to New Mexico that began as early as 1881. No longer aboard expedition surveys, he traveled via recently constructed railroads, connecting through Denver. The newly acquired painting *Indian Pueblo of Laguna, New Mexico*, 1905, is among the works from his visits to the pueblo, west of Albuquerque. As was his typical practice, he made many watercolor sketches during his travels and later created oil paintings in his studio. *Indian Pueblo of Laguna, New Mexico*, was likely inspired by his visit between 1901 and 1902, when he traveled to Acoma and Laguna pueblos after visiting the Grand Canyon.

Indian Pueblo of Laguna, New Mexico, is a rare example of a major painting featuring a pueblo. The work was first exhibited at the National Academy of Design in New York City in December 1905, along with paintings of Long Island, New York, and Venice, Italy. The painting has an amalgam of characteristics found in Moran's works, including a warm sunset reminiscent of Turner. The artist anchors the scene with specific architectural elements and local people, elements shared with his Venetian scenes. Indian Pueblo of Laguna, New Mexico, also takes on the theme of the passage of time. The pueblo dwellings in the left foreground are from a time past, an earlier antiquity, while in the deeper background is a catholic church, a presence that is a more recent addition to the Southwest.

Acquired with funds from generous museum patron Henry Roath, *Indian Pueblo of Laguna, New Mexico*, will join two additional Moran oil paintings, *Sunset, Green River Butte* (1915), and *A Snowy Mountain Range, Path of Souls, Idaho* (1896), donated to the Denver Art Museum in 2013.



National Volunteer Appreciation Week is April 18-24. We'll be celebrating virtually this year with a Zoom call on April 22 to announce the Cile Bach Award Winners and honor volunteers who have reached 5, 10, 20, 30, 40 years of service. While we are so thankful for our volunteers every day, we enjoy remembering all that they have done for us at this time each year. 2020 was an unusual year for all of us and particularly for our 360 active volunteers. After a busy few months supporting our visitors in and out of the *Monet* exhibition, we all went home on March 13 to keep everyone safe from the virus. We didn't know then that this meant the rest of the calendar year.

PIVOTING DURING THE PANDEMIC

A team of volunteers immediately started sewing and delivering masks for onsite staff using CDC recommendations. In April, volunteer leaders and staff were meeting on Zoom to plan weekly virtual programs and gatherings. Christoph Heinrich and other staff administrators met with volunteers to talk about the changing landscape at the museum related to the pandemic. Curators and docents provided art talks on artworks from the DAM's collection to more than 150 volunteers per month. Volunteers also met virtually in small groups to talk about art, play games, socialize, and plan for our eventual return to the museum. Additionally, many volunteers

have stepped up to support staff either from home or social distancing at the museum in small groups.

STRATEGIC PLANNING

In December more than 60 volunteers and staff restarted our work on implementing our strategic plan for volunteer engagement. This work began in 2019 and took a hiatus for nine months in 2020. Committees are meeting again to look at goals related to creating a volunteer model that is equitable, inclusive, unified in terms of volunteers and staff, and that has best practices that allow for volunteers to make the greatest impact at the DAM. This work now will prepare us for reopening the Martin Building to the community with our best foot forward.

We count on volunteer support specifically in the areas of education, visitor services, merchandise processing, communications, conservation, curatorial, volunteer management, administration, event production, and facilities. We thank volunteers for their amazing commitment to the DAM through it all. We look forward to working with you all in person when it is safe to do so.
